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"Creating Cohesion" Workshop a Success

In November, IPAGS conducted a workshop titled "Creating Cohesion: Special Considerations in Treating Children and Adolescents." This was a round-table discussion led by Dr. Elizabeth Yellen, a clinical psychologist at Erie Neighborhood House. Dr. Yellen began the discussion with personal accounts of her extensive experience working with child and adolescent populations across cultures.

Among the topics explored was the nature of play therapy, therapeutic approach, and interventions. Participants showed particular interest in the manifestations of trauma and ways of tracking traumatic reenactment in treatment. Dr. Yellen illustrated the many faces of trauma through a survivor's life as seen in play, interpersonal relationships, and trans-generational patterns among parents who were also survivors of abuse. Included in this discussion was the process of reporting abuse and its impact on future treatment, particularly within various cultural contexts. The dialogue progressed towards techniques that integrate parents into the therapeutic process.

The personal and professional benefits of presenting research posters

As if graduate school wasn't complicated enough, the pressure to publish can add another daunting task to the list of things you'd like to do before you hit the job market. Why, you might be thinking, is there so much emphasis in our field on publication? Why do those lines on your CV mean so much to faculty and future employers, when all you want to do is get great training and start working?

Presentation of your research may be easier and more important than you think. For clinical psychologists, sharing information is foundational to the scientist-practitioner model. Without both basic and applied research, therapists have no grounding for theories, no credibility for their methods, and no assurance that what they do actually helps clients. So how can you join in this process?

Presenting a research poster is a relatively easy way to share ideas. First, you need a research idea. A mentor at your school or other training site can be instrumental in helping you shape your project. Once you have an interesting piece of research, find the right audience. Sometimes smaller conferences are more specialized, while others include broad areas of psychology. Your mentor can help you choose an appropriate conference for submission.

When creating your poster, you are telling the story of your scientific inquiry. Think of how you can succinctly teach the audience about your project. Allow yourself to use many aids. There are excellent resources online and in books published by APA that detail the construction of successful research posters. Allow yourself plenty of time to plan the poster within the conference's specific guidelines.

Finally, the big day arrives. During your poster session, be prepared to discuss the project with passers by. Be open to their advice—perhaps a leader in your field will provide a golden insight that can help you improve your project. Bring along a notebook to jot ideas, business cards if you have them, and a sheet to record the contact information of persons who are interested in learning more about your work. This networking can be of critical assistance later on when you are looking for funding or a job.

Most of all, enjoy this experience! How often do you get to take a break from the bustle of your everyday routine and gather with people who all care about the same topic? This is an opportunity to meet people with fresh ideas on your topic. Be clear, be concise, and remember to enjoy yourself.

My area of interest includes developmental factors involved in women's exercise motivation throughout the life span. I am especially interested in factors related to 'excessive exercise', being the result of obligatory thoughts and behaviors related to eating disorders.

My past research includes my thesis project entitled, *Concurrent Validation of the Emotional Assessment System (EAS) with the Personality Assessment Inventory (PAI)*, completed at Roosevelt University Chicago, 2005. This empirical project was conducted in order to further assess the validity of the currently developing Emotional Assessment System (EAS).

As a Graduate Assistant at Loyola University I am currently involved in a research project studying language development in bilingual and monolingual children. We are assessing children's language development for English, Spanish, and Urdu, in Chicagoland schools.

A research project soon to take place involves assessing the effects of sociocultural factors in older and younger Indian-(India) and Indian-American women, comparing such factors as the role of dress, traditional (covered) and nontraditional, on their perception of body image. Participants will complete questionnaires designed to measure preference and comfort level of clothing, body image perception and preference, and media exposure. My hypotheses will consider choice of dress and age involving views of body image. The number of years women have lived in the United States will also be expected to influence their views to be more favorable of the thinner image.

Another research project on the horizon involves assessing a developmental trend in exercise motivation between school-age and college-age women, measuring body image, family dynamics, current health, and other cultural factors. Participants will complete questionnaires designed to measure body image concerns and attitudes about exercise. My hypotheses will relate to the presence of body image concerns influencing the impact of obligatory thoughts and behaviors associated with exercise.

My goals for the future include avid research and teaching. I hope for the opportunity to teach at a collegiate institution with the ability to promote the importance of psychological research among students.

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Both the facilitator and the participants engaged in a conversation of the importance of including the parents as your clients, creating an environment where they can share their parenting experience, receive psycho-educational direction, and linkages for further treatment. The discussion closed with Dr. Yellen's account of working with differing cultures and races. Dr. Yellen's picture of working with this population helped give participants an alternative look at treatment beyond the books, fostering increased awareness
